Medical Compact Announcement

The Interstate Medical Licensure Compact (Compact) offers an expedited pathway to licensure for qualified physicians who wish to practice in multiple states. Through the Compact, an eligible physician can apply for separate and full licenses in any or all states that are participants in the Compact. The State Board of Registration for the Healing Arts has been actively engaged with other state entities and the Compact Commission to address foreseeable issues in order to integrate existing procedures and to ensure a smooth rollout for Missouri physicians as well as physicians seeking licensure in Missouri. The Board anticipates activating the Compact on October 28, 2024. AAFP Request for Commission Nominations

The American Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP) has released its Request for Nominations for <u>AAFP Commissions</u>, the <u>AAFP Delegation to the American Medical</u> <u>Association</u> (AMA), and the <u>American Board of Family Medicine (ABFM) Director</u>. At the December 2024 meeting, the AAFP Board of Directors will fill 35 commission vacancies, including five Chapter staff positions on eight AAFP commissions, five AMA Delegation positions created by expiring terms of members, and five nominees to be submitted for consideration of appointment to the ABFM for its Board of Directors.

Missouri members interested in applying must contact Kathy Pabst (<u>kpabst@mo-afp.org</u>) before applying for a support letter. **The deadline for commission nomination submission is October 15.** Members <u>can use online application forms</u> for the commissions, the AAFP AMA Delegation, and the ABFM Director nomination process.

The AAFP is working with lawmakers to secure positive, inflation-based annual updates for Medicare physician payment, They are also advocating for a payment system that enables family physicians to invest in practice transformation and adopt alternative payment models something that is out of reach for most primary care practices given the long history of undervalued payment for primary care. Without reform, the current Medicare payment system will further destabilize primary care practices, accelerate consolidation, and erode the primary care physician workforce.

AAFP and MAFP Call for Regulatory Reform This Fall

The Medicare program is essential in helping millions of people access comprehensive, continuous primary care. However, Medicare physician payment declined 29% between 2001 and 2024, when adjusted for inflation. While the 2025 Medicare physician fee schedule proposed rule includes some proposals to strengthen primary care, its 2.8% reduction in the Medicare conversion factor once again highlights the urgent need for congressional action to ensure that physician payments keep up with the costs of running a practice. <u>Read the AAFP's response to the 2025 MPFS proposed rule.</u> MAFP's comments are available by emailing <u>kpabst@mo-afp.org</u>.

The AAFP is working with lawmakers to secure positive, inflation-based annual updates for Medicare physician payment with an annual inflation-based payment update tied to the Medicare Economic Index. Without reform, the current Medicare payment system will further destabilize primary care practices, accelerate consolidation, and erode the primary care physician workforce.

The AAFP supports efforts to improve maternal health outcomes and address significant shortcomings in holistic, comprehensive care through pregnancy, birth, and postpartum services. However, we are concerned that without further tailoring of the requirements, small and rural hospitals may experience undue burdens while they continue to struggle to meet the need for maternity care services in underserved communities.

Family Physicians Disappointed by Non-compete Injunction

The AAFP is disappointed in a federal court injunction to block the Federal Trade Commission's final rule to promote competition by banning non-competes nationwide. As noted in our support for the proposal, noncompete agreements in health care employment impede patient access to care and disrupt care continuity, deter advocacy for patient safety, limit physicians' ability to choose their employers, and stifle competition. The AAFP recognized that legal challenges were likely to result in an injunction. We are supporting the reintroduction and passage of the Workforce Mobility Act, which would ban all non-competes.
